

Introduction

Over the last year, our services have grown to include expanded homeless outreach, Rapid Rehousing, Safe Parking, emergency sleeping cabins, and an encampment resolution project. We still operate two strong domestic violence programs, but now also have a mental health worker, a housing navigator, and an employment specialist—all working side by side to support those who need us most.

This growth hasn't happened because we had all the answers, all the resources, or all the prestige. It has happened because we've partnered with people—faith communities, schools, nonprofit partners, businesses, and neighbors—who came together with dedication, humility, and the simple determination to get the job done.

I may be biased as Executive Director, but what I see every day is that Crisis House shows up—whether or not we have the resources in hand. We show up with work ethic, collaboration, and a deep commitment to people. As you read through this report filled with charts, data, and program highlights, I hope you see more than just numbers. 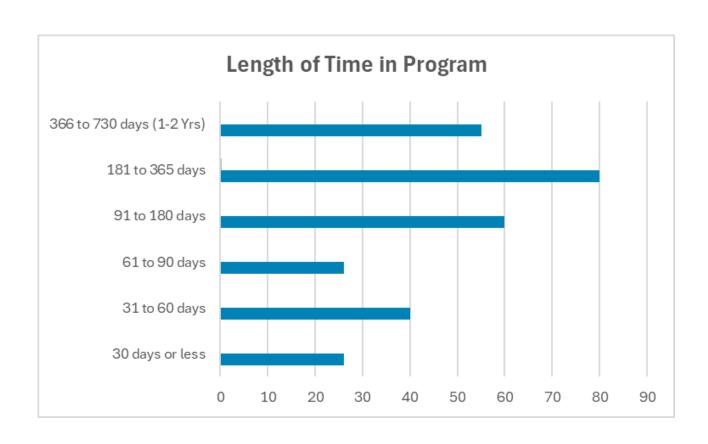

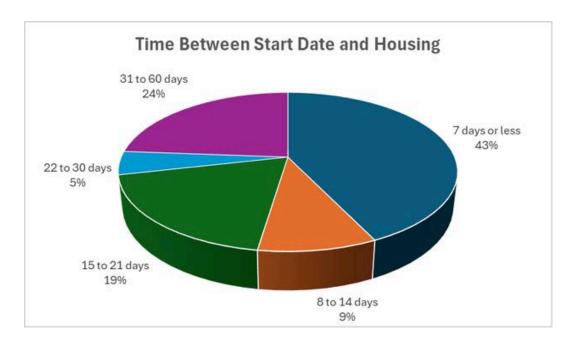

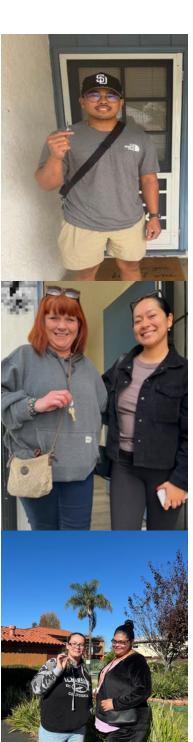


Homeless Services

KEY OUTCOMES DEFINED:

- HOPE: Belief that the future can improve and that one has the ability to create this change.
- RESILIENCE: Ability to adapt and recover from adversity.
- ZEST: Excitement and energy toward goals.
- GRIT: Persevering toward long-term goals.
- OPTIMISM: Expecting positive future outcomes.
- SELF-CONTROL: Managing thoughts, feelings, and behavior when in conflict.
- GRATITUDE: Appreciating help from others and giving back.
- CURIOSITY: Desiring to learn and seek out new information.
- SOCIAL INTELLIGENCE: Understanding others' feelings and motivations.

KEY FINDINGS:

- Statistically significant increases in campers' reports of both hope and resilience.
- Statistically significant increases in counselors' ratings of campers' hope, zest, grit, self-control, gratitude, curiosity, and social intelligence.



"As a camper, it was amazing to be surrounded by people who cared and believed in you. It made me feel seen and helped me believe in myself and choose a life not filled with hate. Now as a staff member, it is amazing to be able to give back in the same way when I was a camper. Even when I doubt myself and struggle with my own dreams or how I view myself, I see
